The Church Teaches...



How can we not take notice of the post-Resurrection greeting of Jesus? “Peace be with you.”

This greeting of the Lord in that upper room is rich in meaning. It has to do with something far more than “an end to hostilities.” Peace (or the Hebrew “shalom”) is a wish for wholeness and for holiness in mind, heart, and soul. The power of this greeting of (and in) peace, which is spoken by Jesus, brings healing and reconciliation among the disciples. **What we are invited to see** is who comes seeking that reconciliation and offering that peace – Jesus! It should have been the other way around, right? They were the “offenders” who, by our standards, ought to have sought Him to say they were sorry and beg for peace and forgiveness. But it is not that way in this story, nor is it ever that with God.

Unselfishly, God comes to us. Jesus His Son seeks us. He reaches out, passes through locked doors, penetrates stony hearts, and goes right through walls of guilt and fear to bring the hope and the joy of His peace, especially where there is none.

That Jesus takes the initiative in healing and reconciliation tells us a lot about the meaning of His life, death, and Resurrection. It is the ultimate revelation about the Father who sent Him into this world. The God from whom Adam and Eve hid in shame is the one who *begins* the reconciliation. This is the God who seeks communion with humankind, the best and most loved of His creation. What should our response be? Shall we expect that only God will continue to “spend” Himself in this way and we should remain unaffected? Or shall we learn from Him and imitate His example?

The offer of peace, the promise of forgiveness, and the opportunity to live with joy ... all of these are available to us when we are willing reach out and touch others *in His name*, when we are willing to feed others who hunger for understanding, justice, and love.

Truly, the joy with which we live our lives, welcome others, listen to others, and nourish them with hope – this is the Easter witness Christ expects from us. Are we willing to make His ways our ways? As the Epistle in today’s Mass says: “The love of God will then be perfected in them.” What incredible joy would there be if God’s love were perfected in us?


The Holy Cross School Jog-a-Thon Fundraising is live!

The Resurrection of Jesus is such overwhelmingly Good News that a single day is not enough to celebrate it. His rising is meant to be celebrated for the whole liturgical season of Easter (until Pentecost, the Fiftieth Day), and every Sunday thereafter (each as a “mini-Easter”).

Let's remember that we spend 40 days preparing for Easter. We choose something from which to fast. We put thought and effort into our prayer lives. We look for ways to give back to others in need. Then Easter arrives, and so many of us are content to celebrate for the day and then go right back to our old life.

Easter, however, is a time of fresh starts and is the perfect time to enter into “liturgical living” – the worship cycle of the Church. For example, each Sunday of the year is meant to be a day of rest, and indeed, a mini Easter celebration all its own. During these Fifty Days of Easter, “lean into” Sunday as a feast day. Ask yourself, “What would it take to make Sunday look and feel different from the other days of the week to me and my family?”

Celebrating Sunday in a new way might mean completing extra chores on Saturday so there are fewer things that truly need doing on Sunday. Or perhaps it means saying no to errands and sports.

Whether you take a hike, visit a museum or just stay at home, try to do something special that you will all enjoy and see how it refreshes your spirit. Notice how much good it does your soul to take a true day of rest – as God intended.

St. Luke's Easter account says, “Jesus Himself stood among them and said to them, ‘Peace be with you.’ But they were startled and frightened...”

Each day, throughout the day, we have many opportunities to “see the face of Jesus” in others and to “be the face of Jesus” to others. Do we actually provide “peace” to those we encounter or are we afraid of what they will think of us? Does our fear paralyze us into doing nothing? Do we dare pray for the strength and courage to willingly share His presence with those we meet each day?

St. John's Easter account says, “Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples that are not written in this book.” What signs and wonders have we witnessed in our lives that are not written in the Bible, but have given us faith or strengthened our faith in Jesus? As part of our faithful response as “stewards of the truth,” we are encouraged to share “our” Gospel. When we bear witness, we release God’s love from our heart to another’s heart.

LA IGLESIA NOS ENSEÑA



La escena que presenta hoy San Lucas (24, 35-48) tiene muchos puntos de contacto con la que el pasado domingo nos ofrecía San Juan: en el marco de una reunión fraternal de los discípulos, Jesús se manifiesta vivo, les convence de la realidad de su Resurrección, y les confía la misión de anunciar la Buena Noticia a todos los pueblos.

San Lucas hace hincapié en el realismo de la presencia de Cristo, e insiste en dos puntos – Jesús come delante de ellos y Jesús les ilumina el sentido de las Escrituras – que nos pueden ayudar a comprender el paralelismo de esta escena Evangélica con lo que hacemos cada domingo en la celebración Eucarística.

En efecto, toda la celebración de la Misa se orienta a suscitar la presencia dinámica de Cristo en medio de nosotros. El solo hecho de nuestra reunión fraternal provoca ya una primera presencia de Cristo, “porque donde estén dos o tres reunidos en mi nombre, allí estoy yo en medio de ellos.”

El “presidente” de nuestra reunión Eucarística (el sacerdote) es “otra presencia de Cristo,” porque en virtud de la misión que ha recibido, habla y actúa en su nombre, y nos saluda, al igual que Cristo a los primeros discípulos, con el deseo de la paz.

También, la primera parte de la Misa no es más que la proclamación de la Palabra de Dios, la lectura de los libros que hablan de Cristo y a través de los cuales nos habla el propio Cristo. **Finalmente**, la Misa pone a nuestro alcance la entera realidad de la presencia dinámica y santificadora de Cristo, constituyéndose así en el lugar más intensamente privilegiado. Y podemos afirmar que todas estas presencias, o, mejor dicho, esta única presencia intensificada gradualmente, no tiene otra finalidad que la de hacernos entrar en contacto con Cristo, para que nosotros, una vez terminada la celebración y ya de vuelta a nuestra vida habitual, seamos entre los demás signos vivos de Cristo, presencias dinámicas y vivificadoras de la fuerza de nuestro Salvador, cumpliendo así las palabras con que acaba el Evangelio de hoy: “Y ustedes son testigos de esto.”

PARA REFLEJAR....



Es curioso lo que supone en la vida de Jesús “la comida” como signo de fraternidad, expresión de amistad, y ocasión para comunicarnos su mensaje.

Comiendo con publicanos y pecadores nos revela para quién ha venido. En una comida de cierto rango social acoge a la pecadora y la defiende, mientras que al anfitrión le pide cuentas por no haber cumplido unas normas elementales de cortesía que para Él, en ocasión distinta, son totalmente secundarias.

En otra comida, a la que Él se invita, nos revela que con Él ha entrado también la salvación a aquella casa. En una comida singular (la Cena Última con los suyos) Jesús nos adelantará su entrega, la perpetuará en un sacramento, tendrá para con los suyos las más hondas expansiones, y nos dejará aspectos fundamentales de su mensaje.

Será precisamente en varias comidas en las que Jesús se aparecerá a los suyos y los hará partícipes de su Resurrección, de manera que el propio Pedro lo recordará, años más tarde, en uno de sus sermones: “Nosotros, que comimos y bebimos con Él después que resucitó de entre los muertos.” (Hechos 10, 41)

Jesús en Lucas 24,35-48 pide de comer para así fortalecer su fe, quitar sus miedos, y traspasarles su paz. La sencillez, la cercanía, el diálogo, y la fraternidad, son en Jesús (y deberían ser en nosotros) signos de “una vida nueva.” ¡Aleluya!



Para quienes se encuentran inmersos en el mundo secular, la Pascua ha llegado a su fin. Los huevos de chocolate y las demás dulces, que aparecieron tentadoramente en las tiendas en cuanto los cristianos iniciaron el ayuno de la Cuaresma, han sido retirados de los estantes de las tiendas para ser reemplazados anticipándose a la próxima fiesta comercial.

Para nosotros, qué contradictorio parece todo esto. Si, nosotros creemos que el misterio Pascual y los eventos de la Pascua, de cambios en la vida, no han terminado. Ellos no son un final sino un inicio triunfal, y han alterado nuestras vidas en una manera radical. Nosotros hemos concluido la Cuaresma y estamos ahora celebrando la temporada Pascual, tratando de profundizar todo el tiempo una relación con la persona de Cristo. Esto es tan simple, y al mismo tiempo, tan sorprendente y complejo.

Cuanto más profundo crece la relación, tanto más nos arraigamos a ella, y esta relación con Cristo más dominará nuestras vidas. Nosotros no clasificaremos a Jesús, lo mantendremos en nuestro centro. Y los misterios Pascuales nos guiarán a las cuestiones fundamentales en el corazón : ¿cómo administro mis recursos – mi tiempo, mi dinero, mis habilidades y dones, mi vida entera – para que estén al servicio del Reino de Dios? Esta no es una pregunta de tiempo parcial. Esta no es una pregunta estacional que se quita del estante periódicamente. Esta también es una pregunta fundamental que la época de la Pascua nos exige: “Jesús, ¿cómo quieras que yo te sirva?”

Nuestra “campaña para capital” es un programa basado en nuestra necesidad: un nuevo Centro Parroquial. Es un programa bien planificado y organizado, para recaudar una suma sustancial de dinero. El éxito de una intensa campaña como la nuestra, **depende de la participación activa de todos nuestros miembros**.

EL DÍA DEL SEÑOR



A los primeros cristianos no les gusta decir: “Jesús ha resucitado.” Prefieren emplear otra expresión: “Jesús ha sido resucitado por Dios.”
(Hechos 2, 24 y 3, 15)

Para ellos, nuestros antepasados, la Resurrección es una actuación del Padre que con su fuerza creadora y poderosa ha levantado al muerto Jesús a la Vida definitiva y plena de Dios. Para decirlo de alguna manera, Dios le espera a Jesús al otro lado de la muerte para liberarlo de la destrucción, vivificarlo con la fuerza creadora, levantarla de entre los muertos, e introducirlo en la vida indestructible de Dios.

Este paso de Jesús de la muerte a la Vida definitiva es un acontecimiento que desborda esta vida en que nosotros nos movemos.
