The Church Teaches...



Today is World Day of Prayer for Vocations

"Dear friends, on this day in particular, but also in the ordinary pastoral life of our communities, I ask the Church to continue to promote vocations. May she touch the hearts of the faithful and enable each of them to discover with gratitude God's call in their lives, to find courage to say 'yes' to God." ~Pope Francis

It seems entirely fitting that we celebrate a Day of Prayer for Vocations on a day when the Gospel for the Mass is about Jesus as the Good Shepherd – who knows His sheep. He lays down His life for them, and is raised up again.

While all of us are called to imitate Christ, some are called to imitate Him in a unique way as the Good Shepherd. Priests and religious are not "hired help," but rather, they give their whole lives to the Church, walking closely with all of us in the joys and trials of life. Let's remember that those who are called to be shepherds must themselves learn to hear the voice of the *Good Shepherd*. That is one of the reasons we pray like we do today: so that those who are called will hear His voice.

But we dare not limit our prayer for vocations to one day! Take these prayers with you into this week:

- For the parish priests we already have: that they will minister with the heart of the Good Shepherd, and that their example will inspire more young people to discern how God is calling them to live their faith.
- For all parents: that they will be open to priestly and religious vocations within their families, and that they will encourage their children to seriously consider every vocation.
- For the renewal of marriages, and for those searching for a spouse: that God will fulfill their hearts' desires.
- For our Archdiocese: that the Holy Spirit will create a culture of vocations here, and that young people in our own parish will respond to Lord's invitation.

"Lord our God, we know that your Son Jesus has a specific task in life for each and every one of us. Each one of us is hand-picked, called by name by Him! There is no one among us who does not have a "divine calling!" Help us to pay attention to the workings of your Spirit and to be obedient to your invitation to love and serve in your Holy Name. Amen."

→ **Update:** The demolition phase of the new Center has been completed by the Lawson Company, which has left the site fully prepared for construction (tentatively scheduled for the end of summer 2024).

We thank our hard-working friends at Soderstrom Architects, our parish building committee, our business manager Deb Volker, and our project manager David Mastroieni for guiding us through the process thus far. We spend 40 days in the Lenten season preparing for Easter. Then Easter arrives, and so many of us are content to celebrate for the day and then go right back to our regular life. How might we extend the joy of this season for more than one day?

Pick a saint to walk with during these special “Resurrection days.” For example, consider St. Mary Magdalene. About her we read: “Go to my brothers and tell them, ‘I am going to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.’ Mary of Magdala went and announced to the disciples, ‘I have seen the Lord,’ and what He told her.” (John 20, 14-18)

In St. John’s Gospel, St. Mary Magdalene is given the mission to carry the good news of Jesus’ rising from the dead to the Apostles and the other disciples. She had been in the company of Jesus and His followers, and is given the privilege to announce the hope of new life. She has been known over the centuries as “the apostle to the Apostles.” Jesus called her by name, gave her the eyes of faith, and called her to give a unique personal witness to her friends in the faith community, the early Church. Her role today is very much the same and she can continue to inspire us in many ways.

Ask St. Mary Magdalene (or the saint you have chosen) to help you be grateful with God’s Word of Life, the power of the Sacraments, and the chance (each day) to advance in the way of salvation.

Have you ever been in a situation where you have shared a God-given gift (perhaps your time, talent, or treasure) and it resulted in something wonderful – and was accompanied by compliments and accolades? How do you handle admiration, esteem, or approval? It would be easy to get caught up in the moment, wouldn’t it?

St. Peter finds himself in one of those moments in Acts 4, minus the compliments! Referring to the healing of a man, St. Peter credits, who? Not himself, but “Jesus Christ the Nazorean, whom God raised from the dead.”

We are stewards of all of God’s gifts, including His glory – but whose “glory story” are we most often sharing?

When we pray, do we only ask Jesus for the things that we want? Do we ever ask Him what He wants from us?

Do we ask Him to help us share His glory? And do we stick around to listen for His response? Even if He responds in “quiet whispers” that are not so obvious, can we be patient enough to let Him, our Good Shepherd, work His wonders in and through us?

LA IGLESIA NOS ENSEÑA



El símbolo de Jesús como “pastor bueno” produce hoy en algunos cristianos cierto fastidio. No queremos ser tratados como ovejas de un rebaño. Decimos que no necesitamos a nadie que gobierne y controle nuestra vida. Queremos ser respetados. Pensamos que no necesitamos de ningún pastor. *No sentían así los primeros cristianos.*

La figura de Jesús Buen Pastor se convirtió muy pronto en la imagen más querida de Jesús. Ya en los cementerios de Roma se le representa cargando sobre sus hombros a la oveja perdida. Nadie está pensando en Jesús como un pastor *autoritario* dedicado a vigilar y controlar a sus seguidores, sino como un pastor bueno que cuida de ellas.

El “**pastor bueno**” se preocupa de sus ovejas. Es su primer rasgo. No las abandona nunca. No las olvida. Vive pendiente de ellas. Está siempre atento a las más débiles o enfermas. No es como el pastor mercenario que, cuando ve algún peligro, huye para salvar su vida abandonando al rebaño.

Jesús había dejado un recuerdo imborrable. Los relatos en los Evangelios lo describen preocupado por los enfermos, los pobres, los marginados, los pequeños, los más indefensos y olvidados, y los más perdidos. No parece preocuparse de sí mismo. Siempre se le ve pensando en los demás.

Los creyentes de nuestro siglo vivimos con frecuencia una relación bastante pobre con Jesús. Necesitamos conocer una experiencia más viva y entrañable. No creemos que Él cuida de nosotros. Se nos olvida que podemos acudir a Él cuando nos sentimos cansados y sin fuerzas o perdidos y desorientados. Pero una Iglesia formada por cristianos que se relacionan con un Jesús mal conocido, confesado solo de manera doctrinal, un Jesús lejano cuya voz no se escucha bien en las comunidades – corre el riesgo de olvidar a su Pastor. Pero, ¿quién cuidará a la Iglesia si no es su Pastor?

“El Señor es mi pastor, nada me falta.” Salmo 22

PARA REFLEJAR....



El Domingo del Buen Pastor es también el Día Mundial de Oración por las Vocaciones. **Siempre esperamos** que gente que está a cargo de otros, especialmente en tareas de liderazgo y servicio, como médicos, trabajadores sociales, sacerdotes, Religiosos, padres y madres de familia, y ministros sagrados, se dediquen responsablemente a los que confían en ellos.

Los católicos no tenemos otro modelo que Jesús, el Buen Pastor. Él era todo corazón para con las personas, y estuvo dispuesto a ir tan lejos como hasta dar su vida por ellas. Todos los que tienen responsabilidad para con otros debieran ser como Él: no fríos funcionarios, no gente que se contenta sólo con hacer su trabajo, sino (ya sean laicos o ministros ordenados), todos con un corazón totalmente dedicado y comprometido aun a costa de sí mismos. **Y no olvidemos** que todos tenemos confiado el cuidado mutuo, unos de otros como hermanos y hermanas. Que Jesús nos inspire y nos guíe siempre.

En la respuesta a la llamada de Dios, por Cristo, en el Espíritu Santo, hay algo que todos nosotros tenemos en común: ser discípulos del Maestro y ser enviados por Él a vivir y anunciar el Evangelio. Somos “discípulos misioneros,” como dos dimensiones simultáneas de nuestro ser católicos: “siempre aprendiendo y siempre enviados.”



Para quienes se encuentran inmersos en el mundo secular, la Pascua ha llegado a su fin. Los huevos de chocolate y las demás dulces, que aparecieron tentadoramente en las tiendas en cuanto los cristianos iniciaron el ayuno de la Cuaresma, han sido retirados de los estantes de las tiendas para ser reemplazados anticipándose a la próxima fiesta comercial.

Para nosotros, qué contradictorio parece todo esto. Si, nosotros creemos que el misterio Pascual y los eventos de la Pascua, de cambios en la vida, no han terminado. Ellos no son un final sino un inicio triunfal, y han alterado nuestras vidas en una manera radical. Nosotros hemos concluido la Cuaresma y estamos ahora celebrando la temporada Pascual, tratando de profundizar todo el tiempo una relación con la persona de Cristo. Esto es tan simple, y al mismo tiempo, tan sorprendente y complejo.

Cuanto más profundo crece la relación, tanto más nos arraigamos a ella, y esta relación con Cristo más dominará nuestras vidas. Nosotros no clasificaremos a Jesús, lo mantendremos en nuestro centro. Y los misterios Pascuales nos guiarán a las cuestiones fundamentales en el corazón : ¿cómo administro mis recursos – mi tiempo, mi dinero, mis habilidades y dones, mi vida entera – para que estén al servicio del Reino de Dios? Esta no es una pregunta de tiempo parcial. Esta no es una pregunta estacional que se quita del estante periódicamente. Esta también es una pregunta fundamental que la época de la Pascua nos exige: “Jesús, ¿cómo quieras que yo te sirva?”

Nuestra “campaña para capital” es un programa basado en nuestra necesidad: un nuevo Centro Parroquial. Es un programa bien planificado y organizado, para recaudar una suma sustancial de dinero. El éxito de una intensa campaña como la nuestra, **depende de la participación activa de todos nuestros miembros.**
